## Security Bank Earnings, Resources Show Increase

Security First National Bank's consolidated net operating earnings for the nine months ended Sept. 30 were at a record level, 2.7 per cent above the same period last year, Lloyd L. Austin, chairman of the board, has reported.

Total resources and both demand and time deposits also reached new highs, Austin said.

Net operating earnings as of Sept. 30, totaled \$29,996,304, equal to \$2.29 per share. This compares with \$29,201,825, or \$2.23 per share for the similar period of 1966.

THE BANK'S third quarter earnings amounted to \$9,935,337, or 76 cents per share, against \$9,989,077, of 76 cents per share in the corresponding quarter of last year.

Per share earnings for 1966 are adjusted for the 15 per cent stock dividend declared

last June 9, which increased the number of shares outstanding from 11,400,000 to 13,110,000.

Total resources as of Sept. 30 were a record \$5,386,567,717, against \$5,001,058,225 a year earlier.

TOTAL DEPOSITS reached a high of \$4,908,945,819, compared with \$4,546,001,875 as of Sept. 30, 1966.

Demand deposits rose to \$2,274,080,656, as of Sept. 30, against \$2,163,948,240 a year ago, and time deposits increased to \$2,634,865,163, compared with \$2,372,053,635 a year earlier.

Loans, less reserves, totaled \$2,768,302,255, against \$2,774,811,985 a year ago. Capital funds, as of Sept. 30, were \$366,926,869, compared with \$346,590,447 on the same year ago date. Total securities amounted to \$1,618,484,553.
