
Plans Approved for New Wilmington Storm Drain

Approval of plans and specifications for an additional million-dollar storm drain project in the Dominguez and North Wilmington area was announced Tuesday by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Bids were opened in the offices of the County Flood Control District Chief Engineer the same day the Board of Supervisors met, Chace said.

Work is to begin in two to three weeks after the contract is awarded and will take about a year to complete, Chace added.

Design of the storm drain facility was supervised by County Engineer John Lambie, with Flood Control Engineer Walter Wood and personnel of the Flood Control District overseeing construction of nearly two miles of re-

More Instructors Needed For Babysitting Classes

'Requests for baby sitting classes are coming out of the walls and we need instructors,' Mrs. Abner Kaplan, chairman of Red Cross Nursing Services, said today.

Red Cross offers to boys and girls 11 years and older. Red Cross gives a six-hour training course to prepare instructors for the youth training program which includes hints for entertaining young children, precautionary health and safety measures, simple first aid techniques, and pointers on babysitting ethics.

Another lesson deals with recreation and is often more effectively presented by a recreation specialist. Course instructors are free to arrange such supplementary prizes.

SUGGESTIONS as to speakers and films available through Red Cross are given during the instructor training course.

Mrs. Kaplan asked that any women interested in serving the community as a qualified Red Cross instructor for Mother's Aide courses to call the Southern District Red Cross Service Center in San Pedro.

In addition to classes given at the Service Center, 1499 W. First St., San Pedro, instructors are needed for classes requested by groups in Gardena, Torrance, Lomita, Palos Verdes, Harbor City, San Pedro, and Wilmington.
