

Fog Worse Than Snow For Crash

Los Angeles basin drivers need not worry about driving on slick, vehicle-packed snow but that doesn't mean their worries about adverse driving conditions are lessened.

In fact, fog is a greater menace than snow as a contributing factor in automobile accidents, notes Pacific Telephone's local district manager, Jim Leggett.

"And we get plenty of fog in the Los Angeles area, especially during the fall and winter months."

MORE THAN twice as many bad-weather accidents happen during foggy weather than during a snow, he said. And fog, though most common in low-lying areas and near the ocean, can occur anywhere.

Pacific Telephone, noted for its emphasis on safe driving, puts all drivers of its motor vehicle fleet through an intensive defensive driving course. Included in the course are tips about driving in foggy weather.

"There is no absolutely safe way to drive in fog, but there are several basic rules that can minimize the chances of an accident," said Pacific Telephone's Leggett.

- Make certain you can stop within your sight distance. In fog it's difficult to tell how far you're actually seeing. Watching to see how rapidly objects "arrive" after you first sight them is one way of checking.

- Fog is "patchy." Adjust your speed on the basis of the thickest patches; don't relax when you enter a thinner area.
- Keep the windshield clear. Use both windshield wipers and defrosters.
- Day or night, run with your headlights on "low." Never put the headlights on "high;" you'll only get four lights bounced back.
- "Fog is just a ground-level cloud," the telephone executive reminded. "Don't spend eternity playing a harp atop one cloud because you tried to drive too fast through another."

Board Votes To Continue TB Program

A tuberculosis control program — which has proved very effective in combatting the disease — will be continued in Los Angeles County, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The Board of Supervisors yesterday voted to continue the program started in 1964. The project, financed by the federal government, will cost \$409,261.

"The program establishes additional clinics in the most critical districts across the county," Chace said. "The over-all effect is to strengthen countywide control over tuberculosis."

Additionally, the funds are used to bolster case-finding and surveillance techniques.

Title to 346 Acres Acquired

Three major obstacles to the development of the California State College campus at Dominguez Hills were cleared this week, Dr. Robert Bersi, director of public relations, announced.

They include:

- Final acquisition of the 346-acre campus by the college.

- Approval of the college master plan by the State College Board of Trustees.

- Approval of final plans for the first buildings on the campus.

Bids for the first unit of the college, which will be occupied in the summer of 1968, are being advertised this week, Dr. Bersi said. A contract is expected to be awarded in late November.

Poll Shows Isreal Has Support

Most Americans believe that Israel should retain control of the captured sector of Jerusalem, according to a poll conducted by Congressman Alphonzo Bell (R-Los Angeles) in his June-July newsletter.

Bell, reporting on the poll this week, said 68 per cent of those answering believe Israel should maintain control over the old city. Another 25 per cent do not think so, while 7 per cent are undecided, Bell said.

Results for five other questions included in the poll were:

- Do you endorse federal legislation to prohibit individuals moving from state to state advocating riot? Yes, 67 per cent; No, 28 per cent; Undecided, 5 per cent.

- Do you endorse administration proposals to expand the Office of Economic Opportunity and increase federal aid for local poverty programs? Yes, 48 per cent; No, 52 per cent; Undecided, 7 per cent.

- Do you believe California Congressional districts should be reapportioned prior to the 1968 elections? Yes, 46 per cent; No, 43 per cent; Undecided, 17 per cent.

- Do you favor increasing the number of U. S. military personnel in Southeast Asia as requested by General Westmoreland? Yes, 47 per cent; No, 46 per cent; Undecided, 7 per cent.

- Do you support an increase in federal income taxes in order to curb inflation and balance the budget? Yes, 39 per cent; No, 58 per cent; Undecided, 7 per cent.
