A Long Beach consulting engineer, M. A. Nishkian, has been granted a \$60,550 contract for county supervisors for services on the Dominguez Gap sea barrier project in the north Wilmington area.

The pact involves studies, reports, estimates, subsurface utility and pipeline investigation, soil reports, inspections, and preliminary and final plans.

Nishkian has performed similar services for the district on its Alamitos and West Coast Basin barrier projects, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Local homemakers were quick to respond last weekend when the Better Foods Market here announced a new customer-participation game which offered thousands of dollars in cash prizes for lucky players.


Shoppers by the thousands descended on the local market to get the free game slips which are used to play the simple childhood game of "Tic Tac Toe," now being offered by the market.
