Sunset Accepts Recipe

Mrs. H. G. McCollom of 1828 Marinette St. had a recipe accepted for the November issue of Sunset Magazine. The recipe for cake-topped apple pie appears on Page 144.

With permission from Sunset, the recipe appears below:

CAKE-TOPPED APPLE PIE

5 cups peeled, sliced apple
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon grated lemon peel
½ cup flour
½ teaspoon baking powder

Put sliced apples in lightly buttered 9-inch pan. Combine ½ cup of the sugar with cinnamon and sprinkle over apples. Cover with foil and bake in a 400-degree oven for 20 minutes. Cream together butter and the remaining ½ cup sugar; add egg, vanilla, and lemon peel, beating until thick. Sift flour, measure, and sift with baking powder into creamed mixture; blend well.

Remove foil from apples and quickly spoon the cake mixture over the hot apples. Return to oven for 20 to 25 minutes, or until lightly browned on top. Serve warm or cooled with ice cream or whipped cream. Makes about 8 servings.


