

Solons to Face Same Old Money Problems in 1968

SACRAMENTO — When the legislature returns to renew its battle with the dollar sign next January, it will find all the problems it found a year ago, despite some economies in government and the passage of a tax increase of nearly \$1 billion a year.

This is the careful forecast of A. Alan Post, legislative analyst who is hired by the legislature to advise its members on money matters. Post, with a sizeable staff, provides the lawmakers with their own figures on government costs, to give them something to compare with the statistics of the state department of finance.

Post, who is close-mouthed and supposed to be that way, points out alternatives to the

legislature and leaves the decision up to them.

IN THE CASE of 1968, Post said there will be some big political decisions made by the legislature.

The fact of the matter is, there will be enough money from tax revenues in 1968 to balance a rock-bottom budget and do one of two other things. These other alternatives are: 1) provide capital outlay for state construction, primary buildings for higher education; or 2) provide tax relief for the property owner. But not both.

"The way it looks now, the legislature will have to finance the capital outlay out of increased tax revenues or it wishes to float another bond issue of \$200 million or sales tax would drop back by one-half cent.
