

# New Firm Charged in Liquor Industry Probe

**SACRAMENTO**—The state Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control has charged that the House of Seagram, Inc., imported 808 cases of liquor into the state without paying taxes and then gave the liquor, plus another 1,661 cases, to customers in violation of the law prohibiting free gifts.  
 Announcement of the filing of the accusation came from Edward J. Kirby, state director of alcoholic beverage control, following an investigation of about four months. The violations were alleged to have taken place between

Dec. 23, 1964, and Feb. 27, 1967. Kirby took office about March 1 of this year.  
 Seagrams, along with seven subsidiaries in Los Angeles and San Francisco, holds four licenses in California — beer and wine wholesalers and importers, and distilled spirits manufacturer's agents and importers. If the accusation is proven, the firm would be subject to disciplinary action, ranging from a warning up to revocation of the licenses, Kirby said.  
 Kirby said the firm would have 10 days to answer the charges and could ask for a hearing or admit to the ver-

acity of the charges in the accusation.  
 The 22-count accusation charged the firm with illegal importation of liquor without paying taxes; using distilled spirits as free goods for retail licensees; giving distilled spirits to consumers; giving improper samples to recipients; falsifying records pertaining to the purchase, importation and distribution of the liquor; and agreeing with licensees to violate the fair trade and price posting laws of the state.  
 Kirby said the investigation still was continuing. Prior to filing the accusation against

Seagrams, Kirby has filed accusations against Pabst Brewery and a beer wholesaler in Los Angeles and against the Max Sobel wholesale firm and Beaulieu Vineyards in the San Francisco bay area.

# County Seeks Federal Funds for Area Roads

A resolution requesting \$483,631 in federal funds for county highway projects has been approved, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today.  
 The resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board of Supervisors last Tuesday and will be forwarded to the California Highway Commission for final approval.  
 The county bill asks the commission to set aside that total in the state's 1968-69 budget for use on highway projects in Los Angeles County.  
 Chace, chairman of the County Road Committee, pointed out that state and federal funds are made available to the counties by the state. Counties must provide additional funds to match those provided by the federal government.  
 "It is through the county's use of all available outside sources of funding that we have been able to improve many portions of our County highway system," Chace said.

## Death Toll On Highways On Decline

**SACRAMENTO** — During the first 10 months of 1967, the traffic death toll on California highways was 87 less than last year, the California Highway Patrol reported.  
 For January-October, 3,883 persons were killed in traffic accidents, compared with 3,970 for the first 10 months of last year. The drop in deaths came despite the normal increased travel on highways which is reflected each year.  
 The total deaths for this year still were lower than last year, despite a reversal of an earlier trend which found deaths down each month. In October, 19 more persons were killed — 464 this October, as compared to 445 in 1966.  
 Total arrests and arrests for drunk driving are much higher this year.
