Hearing On Parade Scheduled

Torrance councilmen last night ordered the city's License Review Board to review an application by South Bay Vietnam Summer for a parade permit before Friday. Councilmen acted following a private session with City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier. The anti-Vietnam war group earlier was denied a permit to parade on Hawthorne Boulevard. The group went to court last week and obtained a writ of mandate. Hawthorne Boulevard has since been declared off limits for parades in an emergency ordinance. The License Review Board is to consider a Torrance Boulevard route, it was indicated. A court hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 5, on the writ of mandate. The Lomita Development Co. has received permission from the Regional Planning Commission to erect subdivision directional signs at the corner of South Figueroa at 23rd Streets.

IN THE ensuing debate, Cara Armstrong of the "recreation committee" stated, "I don't like hippies. Anyone who protests our policy isn't a true American." The opposite opinion was expressed by Sue Simmons, who said she felt it was perfectly within the American tradition to express a dissenting opinion. A student who identified himself as John Bybee told junior councilmen that he represented the hypothetical "Young Democrats for Action," the group requesting the permit. Bybee declared that his group didn't want to have to march "in some alley," YDA wanted to attract some attention and "make people aware." Bybee said. Junior council members voted 3 to 4 to deny the parade request, after hearing a statement from police committee member Teri Borrelli. Miss Borrelli said that if the demonstrators wished to march, the council should uphold their right — but not to the disadvantage of holiday shoppers using busy thoroughfare.
