The adoption service sponsored by the Children's Home Society brings about good adoptions, through study of the child, the natural parents and the couple wishing to adopt.

While natural parents are being helped to work out problems in regard to the child's future the Home Society provides care for the child in a temporary boarding home.

Adoptive parents accepted by the Society are not required to meet any fixed qualifications as to income, occupation, education or housing. A happy marriage, emotional stability, good health, and a real love for children are of primary importance. Applications are accepted from couples who already have two or more natural or adopted children as well as from those just starting their family.
