(Continued from Page A-1) Board by Personnel Director Gordon T. Neavig. Neavig also recommended wage hikes of \$2,418,945 for 6,526 employees in the special districts and special fund districts. It was further proposed that the minimum wage be increased from \$346 per month to \$355 per month. This will affect the lowest paid in county government such as laundry workers, institutional helpers and press operators.

A PREVAILING wage was strongly urged for all classifications of hospital workers, including physicians, nurses and interns. Resident physicians and interns were marked for a 6 per cent increase.

Mrs. Elinor Glenn, executive director of the Los Angeles County Employees Union, Local 434, AFL-CIO, said she had confidence that the supervisors would approve Neavig's schedule of pay hikes for hospital workers to become effective June 1.

However, Hollinger sounded the keynote for a battle royal with the union when he said Friday that he would only approve a July 1 date for the raises.

## Eclipse Visible Tuesday

Residents of the Los Angeles area will be able to view a partial eclipse of the sun at the Griffith Park Observatory Tuesday if the weather is clear. Dr. Clarence H. Clemenshaw, director of the observatory, has announced that the facility will be opened to the public at 5:45 a.m. next Tuesday, provided it is clear. The Vermont Avenue entrance to Griffith Park will be opened at 5:30 a.m. The eclipse is scheduled to start at 5:57 a.m., 17 minutes before sunrise and terminate at 7:32 a.m.

PERSONS wishing to view the partial eclipse may do so without charge. It may be observed on the screen at the west end of the Hall of Science. Dr. Clemenshaw warned individuals planning to watch the eclipse with the naked eye to use extreme caution in looking at the glare. He strongly suggested the use of dark glasses to filter the light. There will be no total eclipse of the sun visible in California until the year 2017.
