

South Outlasts Redondo To Win, 1-0.

Wang's Single Does It

Jeff Wang, a junior, slammed a line drive double one foot inside the third base line to score Steve Lehto from second base with the only run of an 8-inning game Friday as South High beat Redondo for the Bay League championship, 1-0.

South concluded its league season with a 13-5 record. Redondo finished with a 12-6 record after losing four of its final five games. Both will compete in the CIF playoff.

Glenn Thompson, who had a mediocre season on the mound, threw a four-hit shut-out at Redondo. Only opposing pitcher Larry Gray got as far as third base against Thompson. Gray was thrown out at the plate after tagging up on a popup to shortstop.

Redondo also threatened in the fifth inning when Dave Harper and Terry Smith punched back-to-back singles, but with two away, second baseman Dan Pace stopped Mark Springer's bouncer from going through and Smith was cut down at second.

The champion Spartans left a runner stranded in the first, second, fourth and fifth innings.

In the sixth frame South loaded the bases with none away but could not score. Thompson singled to center, Dan Doty was safe on a bunting error, and Steve Trudell bunted safely.

Pitcher Larry Gray promptly fanned Steve Lehto and Wang and got Wade Linstad to pop out to first.

With one away in the 7th, Bubba Atkisson walked and Dan Pace singled, but Thompson went out on a fielder's choice and Doty popped to the pitcher.

After pitcher Gray was left at second in the top of the eighth, he struck out Trudell as South came to bat. Lehto tapped a ball in front of the plate that could not be handled by the defense and a moment later he went to second on a wild pickoff throw.

Wang missed two rips at the ball before driving the winning hit down the line for the run.


The official outcome of the game is pending a first inning protest by Redondo's Jim Brideweiser. He claims Gray should have been awarded third base instead of second on an overthrow which Atkisson grabbed falling out of bounds.

For the record Coach Jerry McIlvaine also protested the use of Gray as pitcher from the third inning on. Gray pitched a full game against Hawthorne on Monday.

Tartars, Knights Play 'Home Games'

Three high school baseball champions come from Torrance this year. Each will have a home game to start the CIF playoffs Tuesday.

South High is the new Bay League champ following its 1-0 win over Redondo Friday. Torrance High took over the Sky League hierarchy a week ago by winning 2-out-of-3 from Rolling Hills and Beverly Hills.

Repeating as champion of the Camino Real is Bishop Montgomery which got into the winner's circle for the third straight time. The Knights dined its five league foes three times around for a 15-0 record.

Each school can "frost the cake" by giving a good account of itself in the upcoming CIF playoffs.

In the major "AAA" division South and Torrance are bunched in the upper part of a 32-team bracket with favored El Segundo. The defending champion Eagles have a 23-0 record after finishing last year with 14 straight wins.

South takes on Millikan of the Moore League and Torrance is host to Montebello of the Pacific League.

Montgomery will compete in a 16-school "AA" playoffs. No favorite has been designated.

The Knights are hosts to San Clemente, champion of the Irvine League.

Coach Marvin Woods of Montgomery said he might send his four-year letterman Danny Graham to the hill in the opener, although his ace lefty Richard Perez is primed for the occasion.

on the infield and Nels Straley behind the plate.

New Scoring For Track

League representatives from the 45 CIF, Southern Section, leagues have adopted the nationally recognized track scoring system of awarding six points for first place instead of five points.

The new 6-4-3-2-1 scoring will be utilized in the CIF, Southern Section, meet next Friday night at Mt. SAC as well as at the State Meet in San Diego on June 2 and 3. The State CIF adopted the scoring measure last spring.

In other action the CIF Council established play-off grouping for football, basketball and baseball for the 1967-68 school year.

Football: Division AAAA — Angelus, Bay, Catholic, Channel, Citrus Belt, Coast, Foothill, Moore, Pacific, Santa Fe, Sierra and Sunset.

Football Division AAA — Camino Real, Crestview, Freeway, Garden Grove, Irvine, Montview, Pioneer, Rio Hondo, San Antonio, San Gabriel Valley, Santa Barbara County Sky and Suburban.

Football: Division AA — Frontier, Golden, Hacienda, Imperial, Ivy and San Luis Obispo.

Football: Division A — De Anza, Desert-Valley, Olympic, Orange and Tri-Valley.

Football: Small Schools Division — Arrowhead, Desert-Inyo (major and minor), Mountain Desert and Pinon.

Six-man football division — Academy, Delphic, Prep, and Tri-County.

Basketball and Baseball: AAA — Bay, Catholic, Channel, Citrus Belt, Coast, Foothill, Freeway, Irvine, Montview, Moore, Pacific, San Gabriel Valley, Sierra, Sky, Suburban, and Sunset.

Basketball and Baseball: AA Division — Angelus, Camino Real, Crestview, Frontier, Golden, Garden Grove, Hacienda, Imperial Valley, Ivy, Orange, Pioneer, Rio Hondo, San Antonio, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara County, and Santa Fe.

Basketball and Baseball: A Division — Academy, Arrowhead, Condor, De Anza, Delphic, Desert-Inyo, Mountain-Desert, Olympic, Pinon, Prep Tri-County and Tri-Valley.

The CIF Council also took action to recognize the sport of soccer as an approved sport and established the season to run concurrently with basketball.

Soccer teams will be permitted to schedule 14 games between December 1 and the end of February. It is expected at least 25 high schools will field soccer teams by next year.

The Condor League, which plays soccer instead of football, has been given special Council permission to conduct the sport in the fall instead of the winter months.

Three retiring school men have been honored with gold life passes. They are Carl Metten, retiring supervisor of physical education for the Pasadena Junior High Schools; Bruce Lawson, retiring principal of Keppel High in Alhambra, and Frank Holt, retiring principal of San Luis Obispo High School.
