

# June Horse Show

South Bay Alumnae of the Gamma Phi Beta Sorority will present its third annual Benefit Horse Show on Sunday, June 4, at the Empty Saddle Club in Rolling Hills Estates.

Proceeds from the one day show will be used for scholarships for a graduating senior from the Torrance Unified School District, South Bay Union; and Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District.

Mrs. Mac Hugh, a leading trainer and prominent judge from Bradbury, will judge the 20 classes. Approximately 150 riders from Los Angeles and Orange Counties are expected to participate in the show. The events include English and Western Equitation, Hunters and Jumpers, Pleasure and Trail horses. There are classes for both adult and junior equestrians. This show is recognized by the Los Angeles County Horse Show Exhibitors Association.

Winners will receive a silver trophy and ribbons with three streamlined ribbons awarded through fifth place.

The H. W. Brunskill Perpetual Trophy will be awarded for the first time, to the Champion English rider of the day, Mr. Brun-

skill, a life-long resident of the Peninsula area, has been an avid horseman and supporter of young equestrians. He is presenting a silver punch bowl, on which the winner's name will be inscribed. The bowl will be kept by the winner for 11 months.

The champion rider will also receive a bridle with sterling silver fittings. The bridle is given by the Foothill Saddlery of Orange.

Spectators are invited to attend the show with no charge for admission. Mr. George Myers will provide entertainment during the lunch intermission. Mr. Myers and his talented trick performing Appaloosa Stallion are well known in the horse show world. Refreshments will be available throughout the day.

Trophies and ribbons for the twenty classes are being donated by businesses and interested persons in the area. Persons desiring further information may contact Mrs. Arnold Woods, show manager.


