"The salaries listed here do not tell the whole story," he continued. "Their contracts are for 200 days and most of them teach either summer school sessions or night classes so that their incomes are generally higher than is reflected here."

LYNN LATER told the Press-Herald he questioned the impartiality of an educator — Dr. Wilson is a director of teacher training at the University of Southern California — serving as a member of the school board. Noell Marble, executive director of the TEA, said he felt the board "could have done more." He called the decision an "arbitrary one rather than financial."

Marble said, "Torrance stands to lose a good public school system if the board continues to ignore and place distrust on the opinions of its members."

ADOPTION OF the salary increase, together with a new health insurance package which will cost the district some \$174,000 next year and a 3 1/2-cent tax decrease mean some \$700,000 in reserve funds will be needed to balance the budget, according

IN OTHER action, the Garrett Corporation was given approval on a zone change on several acres of land to be used for parking south of the San Diego Freeway and adjoining Crenshaw Boulevard.

A change from R-2 and A-1 to M-2 will allow the corporation to expand operations within the next three to four years to about 6 or 7,000 employees at the Torrance complex, according to representative John Leinbach.

Funds for Sepulveda Work Voted

A \$3,800 repaving project on Sepulveda Boulevard in the Carson area has been approved, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The work will start immediately along a short stretch of Sepulveda just east of the Dominguez Channel. Construction consists of resurfacing the existing road to join with curbs and gutters built by owners of the adjacent properties.

The project was approved Tuesday by the Board of Supervisors.

"The completed project will reduce maintenance costs, improve drainage and add to the efficiency of Sepulveda," Chace said.
