Punch and dessert were served after an evening of bridge. Mrs. Myer was presented with a magnolia tree for her new home.


Guests included Mmes. Pat Fowler, Carroll McLaughlin, Robert Powers, Tony Santella, Harold French and Beryl Gutridge.


For Nursing Scholarships

The bride, a 1967 graduate of Torrance High, attended El Camino College. Mr. Grebel was graduated from


Palos Verdes High and El Camino.
