

Public Auction Slated Saturday

Plans for a public auction to be held Saturday beginning at 9:30 a.m. were announced today by Baldo M. Kristovich, Los Angeles County Public Administrator.

Kristovich said the auction would be held at the Public Administrator's Warehouse, 4524 Brazil St., near the intersection of Colorado Boulevard and San Francisco Road.

Doors will open at 9 a.m. for a general inspection and jewelry will be available for inspection from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. Kristovich said the auction would last until 6 p.m.

THE AUCTION is to dispose of personal property belonging to 60 estates. Pianos, refrigerators, ranges, and large pieces of furniture will be sold at noon.

Other items being offered for sale include several musical instruments—guitars, violin, a madolin, lute, ukulele, and two accordions.

Stereos, tape recorders, television sets and radio, sewing machines, hospital beds, bed frames and headboards, chests of drawers, china cabinets, night stands, a dining set, clocks, rugs, mirrors, lamps, pictures, and trunks and suitcases also will be sold, Kristovich said.

OTHER ITEMS to be sold include kitchen appliances; books; fishing tackle; china and porcelains from Bavaria, France, and Germany; and glassware.

Jewelry will be sold at 5 p.m., Kristovich said. Also to be sold at 5 p.m. are guns, typewriters, cameras, sterling flatware, assorted coins, binoculars, electric razors, 22 \$1 silver certificates, and a \$5 silver certificate.

Cash or a cashier's check must be presented for full payment at the time of purchase. All items will be sold as is and all sales are final, Kristovich said.

A special auction of furniture and furnishings will be held Tuesday, June 11, Kristovich added.

Causeway Would Ruin Beach, Candidate Says

Dr. Stanley Leonard, Democratic candidate for the California Senate, 25th District, has chosen conservation as his central campaign issue. "If we leave the preservation of our beaches and entire mountain areas to greedy entrepreneurs or professional politicians," Dr. Leonard says, "the trend toward bulldozed California will go unabated."

The controversial plan calls for construction of a freeway across Santa Monica harbor from Malibu to the Venice area.

Dr. and Mrs. Leonard live in Palos Verdes with their four children.

The State Senate hopeful will appear Friday, 7:30 p.m., at a "Candidate's Night" sponsored by the Christian Social Action Board at the Manhattan Beach Community Church, 303 S. Peck Ave., Manhattan Beach.
