

# Bar Officials Will Salute District Attorney Younger

District Attorney Evelle J. Younger will be honored by leaders of Los Angeles County bar associations Tuesday at a testimonial luncheon in the Biltmore Hotel, attorney William A. Drake, president of the Criminal Courts Bar Association, has announced.

"This lawyers' tribute to a distinguished colleague has been organized to give merited recognition to the fact that during 28 years of dedi-

cated public service in the field of law enforcement, Evelle J. Younger has exemplified the highest traditions of the profession of law," Drake said.

Elected 13th district attorney of Los Angeles County in 1964, Younger had previously served as a judge of the superior court, a judge of the municipal court, a special agent of the FBI, Pasadena city prosecutor, a deputy Los

Angeles city prosecutor, criminal division.

Drake noted that the district attorney, a former law instructor and an author of numerous legal articles, has contributed much time and effort to the work of local, state, and national bar associations. He was elected a fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers in 1950.

Innovations by the DA's office to upgrade law enforcement include provision of legal training for officers, publication of monthly Legal Information and Criminal Intelligence Bulletins, institution of round-the-clock legal advisory service to arresting officers, utilization of closed-circuit TV training films, and emphasis on higher educational achievement by staff members.

In the field of legislation, Drake cited Younger's support for the assistance in writing new crime control laws in the areas of the sale and possession of LSD, drunk-driving, juvenile delinquency, the practice of medicine without a license, child beating, possession of fire bombs, and arson.

"Through the adaptation of new laboratory technology and administrative techniques to improve the efficiency of prosecutions, Younger has scored major firsts, such as use of the first 'voice print' and obtaining the first U.S. 'insulin murder' conviction," Drake stated.


