


Recreation Baseball Leagues Organized

Sign-ups for boys' 10-inch baseball for grades three through eight will continue until Saturday, June 15, according to Bob Cook, youth baseball coordinator for the Torrance Recreation Department.



Participants will be divided into three leagues, according to their age and grade. They include the Ivy League for third and fourth graders; the Skyline League for fifth and sixth graders and the Rocky Mountain League for seventh and eighth graders.

2 Titles Won by Metros

East Los Angeles and Long Beach reign as the track and baseball capitals of California junior college sports after scoring impressive victories in state tournaments over the weekend.

In the golf tournament at Santa Maria, El Camino finished second, one stroke back of San Jose, which won with 761.

In the state track and field meet at Modesto on Saturday, the victorious East Los Angeles contingent rolled up 49 points for first place.

Long Beach, so powerful it didn't even need to employ its ace pitcher Darryl Thomas, eased by Sacramento, 2-1, at Blair Field behind the pitching of Leon Hooten on Friday. Saturday's game was a rout. Coach Joe Hicks started freshman Tim Brady in the championship contest and the Vikes romped, 7-0.

East Los Angeles' Dan Moore was named athlete of the meet at Modesto. He won the 220 in 21.0, ran 9.5 in placing second in the 100, and ran two relay legs. Teammate Monty Turner won the 440 in 47.8.

Bakersfield's Steve Wilson pulled off the meet's shocker when he hurled the discus 179-9—the mark winning the event by more than 7 feet. The other first-place winner from the Metropolitan Conference was Long Beach's Sam Gipson, who won the triple jump with a leap of 49-11½. In team scoring, Bakersfield placed eighth and Long Beach 12th with 21 and 17 points, respectively.

Quarantine Placed on Mussels

Mussels are unfit for human consumption in California coastal waters from now until October 31, County Health Officer, Dr. G. A. Heidebreder warned today.

He said the yearly quarantine is necessary to protect people from the highly toxic poison present in shellfish during the summer and fall months.

Dr. Heidebreder reported that issuance of the quarantine is made by the State Department of Public Health.

Under this quarantine, mussels may be used as bait but must be broken open and placed in containers plainly marked in large print: "Mussels may contain poison. Unfit for human food."

Dr. Heidebreder advised that clams should be cleaned and washed thoroughly and that all dark parts (where poison concentrates during the quarantine period) should be discarded. Only the white meat should be eaten. In addition, clams should be taken from areas which are free of sewage contamination.
