

TAXPAYERS ASK IRS

Inquiry Should Turn Up Missing Refund Payment

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—What do I do about a missing refund check? It's been 3 months since I filed and I haven't heard anything yet.

A—Write to your regional IRS service center telling when you filed your return and where it was sent. Be sure to give your social security number as well as your name and address so that your refund claim can be traced.

Most refund claims have already been processed and the checks mailed out. By May 17, a total of 47 million refunds had been processed amounting to \$8.6 billion.

Q—How much can I earn this summer before I have to pay income tax?

A—When your earnings for the year reach \$600, a return must be filed. However, with the exemptions and deductions the law provides, there will be no tax to pay until income reaches \$900.

Don't forget that if tax is withheld from your earnings, a return must be filed to ob-

tain any refund that may be due.

Q—I lost my refund check. Can I get it replaced?

A—Yes, report the loss to your local IRS office. They will give you the forms needed to apply for a replacement check.

Q—The notice I received on my estimated tax installment said I might have to increase my payment because of the change in the Social Security Law. What was that?

A—The maximum annual income subject to self-employment tax was increased to \$7,800 this year. This compares to \$6,600 in 1967. At the present rate of 6.4 percent, this means the maximum self-employment tax is \$76.80 higher than it was in 1967.

On a quarterly basis, estimated tax payments should be increased about \$20 a quarter to take care of this increase for taxpayers subject to the maximum tax. Failure to make this adjustment could lead to a penalty for underpayment of estimated tax.

The second installment on 1968 estimated tax payments was due Monday, June 17.

Q—My return was audited and the agent wouldn't let me take all the charitable contributions I'd claimed. Is there anybody else at IRS I

can talk to about this?

A—You may request a district conference to discuss the disallowed deductions. Procedures for doing this are explained on the notice you received which explains the adjustment.

This conference will provide you with an independent review of the items questioned. Legal counsel is not needed but you may bring someone to represent you if you wish.

In a district conference the taxpayer meets with an experienced conferee, who is not associated with the audit group that examined his return.

Q—Is it true a person needs clearance from IRS before he can leave the country?

A—There is a requirement that aliens show their tax affairs are in order before they can leave the United States. This does not apply to U. S. citizens.

Aliens leaving the country should bring copies of their recent U.S. tax returns to a local IRS office along with a statement of estimated income and expenses for 1968. Aliens planning to return to their re-entry permit and passport.

Details on these requirements are contained in our publication, "U. S. Tax Guide for Aliens," Document No. 5589. Send a post card to any IRS district office for a free copy.

Board Sets Safe Boating Observance

Safe Boating Week has been proclaimed in Los Angeles County from June 30-July 6, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today.

On Supervisor Chace's motion, the Board of Supervisors acknowledged President Johnson's proclamation for boating week and declared a county-wide observance.

"Some 421,000 boats are registered in California, compared to 225,000 in 1958," Supervisor Chace said, "and more than 104,000 of these are in Los Angeles County."

"Because of the increase in boating accidents, causing needless injuries, deaths, and property damage, a week devoted to the promotion of safe boating is appropriate," he said.

"Safe boating can be enhanced by public understanding of safety rules and regulations, and the boating industry and interest groups are doing a fine job in this area," Chace said.

Varied Summer Program Planned at County Parks

Expanded summer recreational programs at county parks have been assured at the direction of Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

Hahn said the expanded program will provide full-time supervision by trained

recreation leaders seven days a week.

One of the key programs will be at the swimming pools where free swimming lessons will be offered each morning. Classes will be open to beginning swimmers and advanced, who will have an opportunity to learn the skills of being a lifeguard.

Last year more than 33,600 learned to swim in this program, known as "Operation Big Dip."

Free recreational swimming will be offered each Saturday morning.

"It is more economical in the long run," Hahn said, "to keep our young people busy in worthwhile activities like learning to swim than to have to build more courtrooms and jails in future years."

The expanded program is aimed mainly at teenagers and young adults and offers a well rounded slate of activities for the summer months.

Phony payroll checks have become a problem, Solis and Fowler pointed out. The pros actually print up their own payroll checks and fraudulent driver's licenses to go with them.

Front men are hired to go out and cash the checks, splitting the profits equally with printers Solis said.

How can storekeepers protect themselves from bunco check passers? Solis and Fowler give the answer in three words: "Know your endorser." Big stores in particular should be more careful who they're cashing checks for, the detectives emphasized.

A shopkeeper should ask for additional identification if he has the slightest doubt about the validity of a check. If doubts still exist, the shopkeeper should tell the check passer that he wants to make a few phone calls to verify the check's worth, Solis suggested.

This is a phony check artist's cue to become highly indignant or leave the store. If this occurs, the shopkeeper should obtain the suspect's description and license plate number, relaying the information to the police.

Shopkeepers may also foil the phony check passer by learning to recognize fraudulent checks and identification. Photocopied bank travel checks may show faint traces of eradicated serial numbers under the visible ones. Furthermore, "ghost" outlines of actual printing on the check may be visible after the photocopying process.

Fowler and Solis pointed out that fake driver's licenses the genuine ones, but small may look remarkably like differences will reveal the phoney. For instance, the California seal on the back is often blurry and the wrong shade of green. The printed red letters on the back may be different in color and type.

Bunco payroll checks are frequently characterized by sloppy, off-center printing. The magnetic serial number may be blurry and thicker than their genuine counterparts, Fowler and Solis said.
