Car Theft Charges Lodged

Car theft and narcotics charges were lodged against two Torrance residents early Monday after police stopped the suspects in the 2200 block of Carson Street.

Police said a faulty license plate light prompted them to stop a car driven by Karen Lee Stewart, 21, of 1613 W. 240th St.

Police searched the vehicle when one of the officers recognized passenger Gerald Lee Waide, 21, of 19321 Donora St., from a previous incident.

The car was found to contain three orange capsules resembling Seconal, a set of 12 car keys similar to those used in car thefts, a charred spoon, a hypodermic needle, a homemade eyedropper, and pieces of cotton, police said.

Both suspects were booked for possession of narcotics, drug paraphernalia, and a stolen vehicle. Miss Stewart was booked for driving without a license and Waide was charged with drunkenness.

Smoking, Matches Top Causes of Fire Losses

Thirty-three men, women and children — about the same number of people that live on your block — die in fires every day of the year in the United States, County Fire Chief Keith E. Klinger said today.

"The annual death toll from fire is appalling," Chief Klinger said in calling attention to the 1968 observance of Fire Prevention Week now being observed.

"In our country, more than 600,000 homes and apartments are destroyed or damaged by fire each year," he said. "The death toll from fire exceeds 12,200, and half of these people perish in home fires."

"THE NO. 1 cause of build-fires is smoking and matches, Chief Klinger stated. But it takes people, careless people, to actually start these tragic fires."

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
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VYRNIE REINTSNA To Open Workshop

Nurses Schedule Three Workshops

Miss Vyrnie Reintsna, R.N., assistant director of nurses at Torrance Memorial Hospital, will open the first of three special disaster workshops for nurses tonight at the Red Cross Service Center in San Pedro.

Miss Reintsna is president of District 21 of the California State Nurses' Association, one of three co-sponsors of the program. Other sponsors are the Los Angeles Chapter of the American Red Cross Nursing Services and the Los Angeles County Health Department.

The four workshops, open to all registered, vocational, and student nurses, will center around preparation and use of disaster hospital facilities.

Mary K. Stanley, immediate past president of the California State Nurses' Association, will be the speaker for tonight's session. A film, "The Shelter," also will be shown.

Other workshops will feature Major Carmelita Simila, staff nurse at the U.S. Army Hospital, Ft. MacArthur, who will show slides and describe the Packaged Hospital used in Los Angeles at the Oct. 16 session. She also will discuss emergency nursing services for the Los Angeles Chapter of the American Red Cross, which will present the final program Oct. 23. She will discuss government and Red Cross responsibilities, nursing functions in a shelter, and public health nursing programs.

All sessions will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Plan for Auto Shop Rejected

Torrance councilmen last night imposed a 90-day moratorium on the construction of automotive service shops after rejecting a proposal for such a center in the North Torrance area.

Before the council was a request to construct a service shop on Redondo Beach Boulevard near its intersection with Hawthorne Boulevard.

Councilmen voted down the request, which has been recommended for approval by the planning commission, after a 90-minute hearing.

The moratorium, approved by unanimous vote, will prohibit the construction of automotive repair facilities within 300 feet of any residence during the next 90 days. Motorcycle repair shops were included in the moratorium.
