

Woman Loses \$4,500

A 60-year-old Torrance woman became the victim of a "pigeon drop" bunco scheme Friday when two strangers talked her into handing over \$4,500 in cash.

Mrs. Grace Eleanor Judkins of 750 E. Carson St., Apt. 5 told police the two strangers, both women, told her that she could have \$1,000 cash if she would first put up a large sum of money as a "guarantee."

Mrs. Judkins said she was shopping at a downtown Torrance store about 1 p.m. when one of the women approached her and another shopper and said, "I just found a bag with a lot of money and tickets in it. Would you girls tell me what to do with it?"

THE VICTIM said she should take it to the police, but the woman said she has a sick child at home and wanted to keep the cash. The other shopper, who turned out to be the second suspect in the case, told the first suspect she should go ask her boss what to do with the money.

In about 10 minutes, the first suspect returned to the shop and approached the two again, saying the sack contained \$3,100 in cash and gambling tickets. She said her boss suggested splitting her money three ways, but added that they should promise not to spend the money for some time and put up a large sum of money as a "guarantee" in case the real owner should appear.

The victim then agreed to put up \$4,500, got into a cab with the second suspect, went to the bank, and drew out the cash.

RETURNING to the corner of Post and Sartori Avenues, the victim and the suspect rejoined the first suspect. The second suspect took the money and disappeared, saying she wanted to show it to her boss.

After a short while, the first suspect said she had to go and explain to her employer why she was late getting back to work. Ten minutes after both suspects were gone, the victim suspected something was wrong and called the police.

The first suspect was described as a Negro woman in her 30s, wearing a black and white checked coat and a white uniform. The second suspect was a Caucasian woman in her late 50s. She wore a light tan coat.

Police said the pair fit the description of a team of "pigeon drop" artists who have been operating for some time in the Los Angeles area.

Taxpayers Warned of Deadline

Taxpayers were urged today to prepare their California personal income tax returns as early as possible so that they can be prepared to pay the full amount due by April 15.

"There are no provisions in the law for partial or installment payment of the tax liability after the April 15 deadline," warns Martin Huff, executive officer of the Franchise Tax Board.

Unlike the federal government or most states which tax income, California does not withhold the tax from wages. The tax due on April 15, 1969, is based on income earned during 1968 and must be paid in full to comply with state law.

"Too many people wait until the last minute to prepare their return only to discover they do not have the necessary funds readily available to pay the tax," Huff said.

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Anti-Smog Legislation Proposed By Beverly

Legislation to control air pollution from aircraft will be introduced today by Assemblyman Robert G. Beverly (R-Manhattan Beach) in response to demands from residents of the area surrounding Los Angeles International Airport, located in Beverly's home district.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors proposed the legislation on recommendation of the Los Angeles County Air Pollution Control District, which has studied the pollution and fallout resulting from increased jet aircraft operations at International and other airports.

The District recommended that a limitation be placed upon emissions allowed from jets similar to the restrictions on emissions from truck and stationary sources. Beverly's proposed legislation is along these lines.

The present law against visible pollution permits heavy emissions for up to three minutes in any one hour. The speed of modern aircraft makes this measurement impracticable because after three minutes from the beginning of an aircraft's takeoff, it has either passed beyond the county boundaries, or is at such a distance from ground observers as to make it impossible to judge the density of the smoke.
