




GOING THROUGH A WORKOUT . . . Nine-year-old Jimmy Hatch of Torrance, a leukemia patient at Kaiser

Leukemia Conquered?

Five and a half years ago James Hatch was a patient at Kaiser Hospital. His illness was diagnosed as leukemia.

At the age of 4, Jimmy developed pneumonia. The family was told, "It is probably a matter of hours!"

Mrs. Rosalie Hatch, the boy's mother, says the hours passed and many prayers were answered.

A new medication for the treatment of leukemia was prescribed for the youngster, and although his muscles were affected for more than three months, the boy is now conditioned for the medicine.

Shy, but determined, Jimmy reached a new milestone in his life last Saturday when he took part in the opening day at Fre-Way Little League as a member of the XK's farm team.

A third grader at Van Deene Avenue School, Jim will be 9 on June 14.

In a two-inning exhibition game, young Hatch played right field and walked in his only time at bat. He wants to be a shortstop. He appears to be more aggressive on the ball diamond than almost anything else in his lifetime. His parents are encouraged.

Jimmy Hatch was a particularly normal youngster until he was three years old. He was bed ridden with a "plain" case of the flu, but when the illness lingered and the tot lost his appetite, became listless, medical attention was required.

It was Nov. 11, 1963, when tests revealed Hatch was suffering from leukemia.

For the first several months Jimmy required blood transfusions and extensive care at Kaiser Hospital. For the past four years the disease has not advanced and the youngster appeared immune to the side effects of medication. At first, it was feared he would lose his coordination. He once spent three months in a wheelchair.

But Jimmy Hatch has always been a determined sort of individual. He has never been one to be pampered by his parents and he has tried to do things like the others in his family.

Brothers Mike, 12, and Steve, 11, play for the Camaros of the Fre-Way League. He also has a sister, Carol, 7.

The boy's father, Gary Hatch, is a cargo traffic representative for Pan American World Airways. The family resides at 21121 Van Deene. It's a short distance from the ball park.

Pair Won By Wild Mustangs

Torrance Wild Mustangs defeated the Torrance Tappa Keggas, 11-8 and 4-2, to take both games of an opening doubleheader in the West Coast Slo-Pitch League at Torrance Park Friday night.

In the first game, the Wild Mustangs broke from the coral to lead the Tappa Keggas, 9-0, by the end of the third inning.

With 12 hits, the Mustang bats went cold, while the Keggas scored three runs in the fourth, two in the sixth and three in the seventh. The Wild Mustangs finally outthit the Tappa Keggas, 14 to 11. In the second game, Cal Eubanks limited the Tappa Keggas to four hits while the Wild Mustangs collected seven hits.

Jim Reynolds, Keggas manager and pitcher, was unable to play Friday because of a knee injury sustained in a practice game with the Upland Bombers. Reynolds may be out of action for two more weeks.

This Friday night the Tappa Keggas meet the Los Angeles Oldtimers, league champs, at Torrance Park in a doubleheader starting at 8 p.m. The Wild Mustangs take on El Segundo Hughes Hustlers the same evening at Alondra Park.


Wrestler Is Third In Meet

Slattery to Head Big Brothers Game

Edward F. Slattery has been named chairman of the 1969 Catholic Big Brothers All-Star Football Game.

It will be played Aug. 14 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

The third annual grudgefest pits the outstanding graduating seniors from Los Angeles city schools against their counterparts from Catholic high schools throughout Southern California.

Proceeds from the game go to the Catholic Big Brother, Inc., which works with fatherless youth.

Last year's inaugural L.A. City-Catholic clash saw the L.A. team win by a landslide 43-20 score before 17,842 spectators at the Coliseum.

In making the announcement, Catholic Big Brothers president Robert C. Yeary said, "We are genuinely pleased to obtain the talents and leadership of a highly-successful man like Ed Slattery. Last year's game chairman, Jim Callanan, is well-known for his athletic background, executive ability, and enthusiasm for sports. With Ed captaining the team, we can indeed look for an outstanding 1969 game."

Slattery, 43, is senior vice-president of Norman Engineering Co., and a former football center at Loyola High School, Loyola University, and in service at the Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, N.Y.

BIGGER ENGINES APPROVED

Driver Survives Crash

A driver who survived a spectacular racing accident is working against the clock to get his damaged car prepared for this Sunday's Riverside Continental Grand Prix.

Bob Brown, 29, a Chevrolet dealer from Huntington, Long Island, N.Y., walked away from a 170 mph rollover during tire tests on Riverside's 2.6-mile road course last Thursday, taken to Riverside Community Hospital as a precautionary measure. Brown

was found to have nothing more serious than a few bruises.

Brown told a Raceway official that he thought he was a goner when his Eagle Chevy locked its brakes and spun wildly at 170 mph.

"I couldn't get the brakes loose, and when I tried to steer to the infield, the car wouldn't respond," Brown said. "I thought to myself, 'This is it.'"

The open wheel formula A car slid off the asphalt and down an embankment alongside Turn 9, bouncing end over end in a maneuver almost identical to one during the crash of Dr. Lou Sell during last November's USAC championship race.

Sell's injuries, however, were caused as the fuel tank split and exotic racing fuel exploded in a ball of flame. The Fullerton dentist is still recuperating from that fiery crash.

Brown's fuel tank remained intact in last week's incident.

The new Eagle driven by the New Yorker appeared to be a candidate for the junkyard when it was towed from the Raceway after the accident, but closer inspection showed that the chassis was apparently not too badly damaged for repair. The question remains — does Brown's crew have enough time before qualifying this Saturday?

OPENING SET FOR APRIL 26

Century Handicap Lengthened

The second running of the \$75,000 added Century Handicap Saturday will mark the first major stakes of the Hollywood Park meeting.

The Century has been lengthened in distance this season to a mile and three-furlongs from the mile and one-furlong. In its inaugural running, easterner Model Fool equalled the course record of 1:47 2/5 with a triumph over Hill Shine and Rivet.

It is possible the Century will match Petrone, winner of the recent San Juan Capistrano grass marathon at Santa Anita, with Nodouble, who captured the Santa Anita Handicap.

Petrone, who turned back former national grass champion Fort Marcy in winning the San Juan, was second to his countryman, imported Taneb, in the San Luis Rey Handicap, prior to taking the \$125,000 classic.

Retirement Announced By Smith

Herschel C. Smith, founder of the annual Compton Invitational Track and Field Meet, announced his retirement from active management of the event he organized in 1936.

Smith will remain in an advisory capacity for this year's meet.

The Compton/Coliseum Invitational will be held in early June at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

Herschel, 65, first gained athletic prominence as a sprinter at San Fernando High in the early 1920's, winning Southern California and state honors.
