ed out by Captain Montz and Colonel Booth. Both the Navy and Air Force offer their programs as "enrichment" classes, it was noted, as well as ROTC programs.

**CAPTAIN** Montz, in charge of the Naval program in the Long Beach schools, said the Navy program is the newest of the three service programs. Emphasis is placed on science and academic study, with about 10 per cent of the actual time devoted to drill.

In addition, Naval ROTC cadets may take a number of field trips and, in Long Beach, many spend a weekend each month at sea aboard a destroyer escort. A few cadets also participate in a five-day Navy recruit training program each spring vacation, the captain said.

Captain Montz also noted the Department of Defense shares the cost of ROTC programs with local school districts.

**THE AIR** Force is perhaps the most flexible of the three ROTC programs, Colonel Booth told the group. It is designated as an aerospace education program and may not be taken in place of physical education.

The Air Force cadets drill one day each week and do not use arms of any kind, it was noted.

The Air Force program can be tailored for individual school districts, it was explained. Both the Army and Navy offer more rigid programs, although both have some degree of flexibility.

**SPECIAL** interest in a junior ROTC program has been expressed at West High School. Students there have petitioned the Board of Education to form a unit of the California Cadet Corps, a unit of the state militia.

Guests at Thursday's meeting included Bert M. Lynn, Burton Belzer, and Stanley Dunn of the school board; Dr. Robert Ford, West High principal; and Dr. Richard Guengerich, assistant superintendent of schools for secondary education.

### Overhead Wiring Must Go

Utility wires on Torrance Boulevard between Madrona and Anza Avenues will be placed underground, following City Council action Tuesday to establish the city's first Underground Utility District. Poles, overhead wires, and associated overhead structures will be removed.

Estimated cost of undergrounding wires in the area is estimated at \$355,000. The money will come from a fund created by utility companies. In District One, Southern California Edison will pay \$275,000, General Telephone will contribute \$75,000, and Pacific Telephone will turn over \$5,000. Completion date is Dec. 31, 1969.

Estimated cost of converting the 65 underground serviced street lights is \$4,350 for the Edison-owned system and \$24,000 for the city-owned system. To pay for the city's share, \$8,600 will come from the general fund and \$16,000 will come from the undergrounding district, which will be repaid by benefitting property owners over a three-year period.

The cost to the affected commercial establishments and office buildings is estimated at \$100 to \$500, depending on the circumstances.

The only utility wire to be left above ground within the district are those servicing oil wells, as conversion costs would be prohibitive.
