Tax Rebate Could Be 'Tax Free'

SACRAMENTO — Additional "tax relief" for Californians moved a step ahead today following passage of SB 343, by Sen. Randolph Collier, D-Yreka, Wednesday.

Collier's measure provides that the anticipated \$70 tax rebate on property voted by the Legislature last year will not be considered as income for computation of 1969 state income taxes.

The measure passed 23-1, with Sen. Clark Bradley, R-San Jose, casting the one dissenting vote. Bradley said the \$70 already has been allowed in the 1968 return as a tax deduction, and pointed out the property owner will get a double deduction if the bill becomes law.

The Legislature has adopted a resolution asking Congress to consider the rebate as a non-income item on 1969 federal income tax returns.

The Collier measure now goes to the assembly for consideration. Home-owners have not as yet received the rebate which is expected sometime in June unless the Legislature extends the time for making application for the \$70.
