Mrs. Otis Bry, president of ESA in California, received proclamation from Mayor Albert Isen decreeing Epsilon Sigma Alpha International week in Torrance.

Founded in 1929, Epsilon Sigma Alpha known as the 'National Reading Society' was a sorority for young women who were mutually interested in cultural progress.

Today, with over 40,000 members in more than 1,600 chapters throughout the world,

May 1 is celebrated as Founder's Day. May 1 to 7, 1969 is the 40th anniversary of Epsilon Sigma Alpha International sorority.

Approximately 10 per cent of the present membership belongs to the California State Council, ESA.

In addition, thirteen chapters in the greater South Bay area belong to Mira Costa Regional Council.

Four of the chapters were chartered in Torrance, Gam-

ma Psi, Eta Kappa, Eta Mu and Kappa Phi.

Epsilon Sigma Alpha has a three-fold purpose of educational programs, philanthropic service and association through social activities.

The International philanthropic project is service and donations to handicapped children. California State Council supports the California Council for Retarded Children. Local chapters may also serve in other causes which are numerous, hospital aid work, scholarships, camperships, youth groups, charity fund drives, preparing mailers for the T.B. Association, Junior Blind and Crippled Children's Foundations are just a few examples.

Educational programs may range from a year's study of the religions of the world, exploring the arts, personal improvement to government through all levels.

Social activities encompass formal balls, fund-raising dinner dances, reunions, teas, luaus, game parties and family picnics.
