It is always a problem to determine what kinds of science courses to offer during a summer program. In this, the college's first full blown summer session, a number of factors had to be taken into consideration.

For example, professional educators in the school districts which surround the campus expressed a need for courses in the natural sciences and mathematics which will aid them in keeping current with the deluge of new books and materials being produced for today's elementary and secondary school student.

Highly motivated high school students, as well, sometimes seek a new experience in the college summer session... This year the California State College, Dominguez Hills, will offer, beginning June 23, a series of six-week courses which we hope will accommodate these and other individual interests. Some are listed below:

Natural History of California. An intensive workshop designed to acquaint the student with varied kinds of habitats to be found in California and with the typical plants and animals of each. Emphasis will be placed on the special adaptations of plants and animals to their environments, on the inter-relationships of species within each habitat, and the impact of man on the natural ecological community. Field trips will be made to representative locations in mountain, desert, canyon and sea-shore areas.

Human Heredity. Introduction to human genetics, including human reproduction, Mendelian inheritance, chemical basis of gene action, mutation and eugenics.

Basic Studies Structure of Matter. Review of operational mathematics. The basic nature and meaning of science; the structures of atoms and of groupings of atoms; structures in the solid, liquid and gaseous states; laws of mechanics and energy factors as related to structure.

Workshop in Chemistry for High School Teachers. Includes a review of elementary and intermediate materials and substantial attention to new developments. The approach to the course, however, will be in a manner to permit students with an intermediate grasp of the field to benefit from the material covered. Areas of particular interest to the group will be given special attention.

Basic Studies Mathematics. Topics in modern mathematics, including set theory and concepts from logic; the real number system and subsystems; the concept of function, sequence and limit; and elementary concepts of calculus.

Differential Equations. Topics covered include first order linear equations, nth order linear equations with analytic coefficients, nth order linear equations with regular singular points, non-linear equations, existence and uniqueness of solutions, systems of non-linear equations. Can be applied to the M.A. in Math.

Mathematics for Elementary Teachers. Course content, presented from a contemporary mathematics viewpoint, includes set theory and mappings, the cardinal number concept and related operations, systems of numeration, non-metric geometry, and the real number system.

Basic Studies Physics. Discussion of basic concepts of

mechanics, electricity and magnetism, light, and topics in modern physics.

Concepts of Natural Sciences for Elementary Teachers. A comprehensive review of materials currently in use at the elementary level. Designed to provide the teacher with the necessary background for his interpretation.

600,000 Now on Welfare Rolls

The problem of welfare is about to strangle Los Angeles County.

Public assistance next year will be provided to just over 600,000 persons — one for every 12 who live in this county.

It is the single largest item in next year's proposed county budget — representing 45 per cent of the total.

Yet, because of federal and state regulations, it is the item least controlled and least governed by your local county government.

MORE THAN 80 per cent of the \$635 million which is expected to be spent in Los Angeles County for welfare next year is paid by federal and state money.

But \$118.4 million — \$18.5 million and 11.8 cents in the tax rate more than last year — must be raised through the county property tax.

And to make the problem even worse, the United States Supreme Court has ruled to do away with residency requirements for welfare.

Taxpayers of Los Angeles County will have to pay for the

welfare citizens coming from Nebraska or Mississippi or other states in the union.

AVERAGE monthly payments under Aid to Dependent Children in Mississippi are \$8.50 as compared with \$47.95 in Los Angeles County.

I predict the high court decision will result in another 100,000 persons on welfare here.

Recognizing the monumental problems of welfare and the fact county government is little more than a paymaster, I have been making every effort to

urge the state and federal government to take over its administration.

WELFARE is a national problem which should be administered at the federal level, similar to the Social Security program.

Welfare payments should be uniform in all 50 states.

If the federal government takes over the administration of welfare, it would save the county of Los Angeles \$118.4 million near year — or more than 71 cents on the tax rate.

Sirhan Trial Costs Top \$900,000, Hahn Reports

The Sirhan Sirhan trial cost taxpayers of Los Angeles County \$929,285, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn reported in releasing the final audit of the most expensive trial in county history.

"Any appeals will add to the expense," Hahn said.

"Let us hope it prevents the need for another Warren Commission, which cost \$6 million to investigate the death of President John F. Kennedy."

Hahn, who has said he believes it is unfair for the people of Los Angeles County to pay

the cost of the trial, has been keeping a continuing audit of all expenses in connection with the case.

County costs through April 30 were \$370,478; additional Sheriff's Department costs, \$110,000; Pasadena Police Department, \$39,978; and Los Angeles Police Department, \$208,829.

Some of the extraordinary costs included \$62,045 to alter the Hall of Justice and Central Men's Jail and \$58,398 for witness fees, jury, and transcribing fees, Hahn said.
