Assignment TV

For several months — perhaps even years — Washington bureaucrats have been studying the TV commercials for dog and cat foods, listening to the barks and purrs of the animal actors as they race for the sponsor's chow, and presumably tasting a little here and there for themselves.

As a result of their finding, the Federal Trade Commission has advised the nation's broadcasters that the following rules are effective Sept. 1. Dog and cat food commercials should NOT:

- Misrepresent the quality or amount of meat in the product.
- Place undue emphasis on the presence of a preferred ingredient.
- Imply that a product is a complete food if, in fact, it is only a supplemental food.
- Use human food terms such as "stew" or "hash" unless the product conforms to the federal standards for such terms.
- Use the terms "meat," "chicken," and "fish" to describe a product that contains animal by-products such as liver, kidneys, lungs, brains, and intestines.

CURIOSLY, there has been little rejoicing on the part of the nation's 43 million dog and cat population over the new regulations which will go into effect at the start of the new television season. This conclusion is based on the results of an exhaustive neighborhood-wide survey conducted by me. (If everyone else can make surveys, why can't I?)

According to tradition, the exact number of animals polled will be swiftly passed over, but I assure you that it was a scientific selection representing all social, racial, and income groups interviewed on back fences, in and around garbage cans, and at the more fashionable curb-side watering spots.

Storm Drain Approved On Highway

Construction of new drainage facilities on Pacific Coast Highway at Avenue I in Torrance and Redondo Beach has been approved by the State Division of Highways.
