'Involved' Churches Proposed

The church must become involved in the political process if it hopes to speak on behalf of "the powerless, oppressed, and disadvantaged," an executive of the United Church of Christ said.

The speaker, Dr. Lewis I. Maddocks, New York, executive director of the United Church Council for Christian Social Action, said the church must also act corporately because decisions are made through organizations.

Dr. Maddocks addressed the annual meeting of the denomination's Southern California Conference at the Claremont United Church of Christ, 233 W. Fifth St. The conference is made up of 50,000 members in 165 churches.

"The tragedy is not that the church is speaking when it should not," he said, "but that it is failing to speak when it should."

"The active role the churches are playing in the civil rights struggle today is largely a result of the guilt they feel for their silence on this issue in the past," he continued. "It is the apathy of most Americans to poverty and injustice which should be deplored."

"In fact, a statement which is the product of compassion and indignation over an injustice should never be condemned," he said. "Even if it results from ignorance, it is better than the apathy which results in indifference and callousness about the needs of others."
